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The West End is fortunate to have many mature tree specimens. These trees contribute

to the historical character and sense of community of our neighborhood. Some even pre-date the houses that they shade. Not only do trees contribute to historical character, but they also...

Improve property values: Homes with tree canopies over streets sell faster and for higher prices than identical homes without street trees. **Decrease energy costs:** Properly selected and sited trees can reduce your heating and/or cooling costs, thereby reducing the amount of fossil fuels used to provide energy for heating and cooling. Reducing the use of fossil fuels also decreases the air contamination generated when such fuels are burnt. A deciduous tree on the southwest side of your home will shade the house from the afternoon sun during the summer, and the absence of leaves during winter will allow the sun's rays to heat your home. Improve air and water quality: Trees improve air quality by absorbing carbon dioxide, releasing oxygen and trapping airborne pollutants such as dirt and chemical particles. Trees improve water quality by reducing soil erosion, controlling stormwater runoff and protecting the aquatic life that acts as natural water filters. Unfortunately West End's only stream is lacking trees on its banks. The few nearby trees that shade the stream have been marked to be cut down. Provide buffers: Trees can buffer us from noise pollution and unattractive sights. A row of dense evergreen trees such as the Red Cedar (Juniperus Viginiana) makes an excellent screen.

For all these reasons and more we need to preserve the trees we have. Although West End has more trees than most neighborhoods it is important that we recognize threats and plant additional trees to replace those that may be lost. Our investments will be rewarded with many of the benefits mentioned above. Future segments will highlight notable West End specimens and will describe each species in more detail. Some of West End's characteristic species that may be highlighted include Hemlocks, Oaks, Poplars, Maples, Golden Rain trees, Redbuds, Deodor Cedars and more.
