Catherine Hendren discussed Local Historic Landmarks and the City Council's decision to deny two properties historic landmark status. The former Wachovia Building and the Dyer House were nominated by the Historic Resources Commission for landmark designation. Catherine made note that the **Latitude Magazine**, formerly the **Domicile**, has a survey on their web site that gives people an opportunity to voice their opinion on the Council's recent decision. Michelle McCullough announced that the Historic Resources Commission is in the process of redesigning the historic overlay guidelines. 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
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Streetcars Again in Winston-Salem?

The Downtown Winston-Salem Partnership held their annual meeting recently and recapped the advances for downtown, which are considerable. The new director, Jason Thiel, shared his past and his enthusiasm.

The speaker was Charles Hales, VP of HDR from Oregon. He has been involved with the Streetcar study in Winston-Salem that we have followed closely in the West End. The City continues to examine this option both for connecting WFUBMC with the Technology Park and all that is between as well as the development that occurs along streetcar lines. Hales recounted the history of the development of streetcars in Winston, and he also recounted and showed pictures of the demise of streetcars in what was later prosecuted as a conspiracy by GM and Firestone as they bought up streetcars to be replaced by buses using gasoline and riding on tires! Streetcars were burnt as part of the celebration of bringing in buses. (Makes one think we are pawns of the energy companies??).

Hale analyzed that cities have moved from carnivals – that is sporting arenas, aquariums, and other attractions – to residential. With residential comes traffic jams and the need for public transportation. Then why doesn't the obvious answer of riding buses work? People aren't logical. In Tacoma, where a bus has run historically, a streetcar now carries ten times more people even though the bus is still there – this is the "mode of performance factor".

So the push is still on to build a streetcar. The track in the West End will include 4th St. to Burke, to First. The cost of the initial pattern would be \$52 million. - George Bryan

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
